#### PRESIDENT'S PRATTLE

**Outdoor Transportation Community** 

As we observe "Motorcycle Awareness Month," we can appreciate how other outdoor (i.e., open vehicle) modes of transportation enjoy features and areas of interest common with motorcycling. The boots I wear when riding are the kind I prefer to use on horseback. They find a stirrup and hold onto a foot peg with equal ease – and offer good protection. My chaps and headwear, however, just cannot make the transition from steel horse to the flesh & blood kind as easily.

Nearly 24 years ago, I met with my brother Ron for a trip to Sturgis and, afterwards, through the Rockies. Concerned that the week plus adventure of riding, camping, etc. (It is the "etc." that will get you!) might demand more than I could deliver physically; I increased the miles I usually ride on my bicycle. This exercise paid off wonderfully when we had days full of long miles and when we crossed the Great Divide off pavement on Hagerman Pass.

Bicycling and hiking also benefit motorcyclists by spurring the development of strong, durable, light—weight camping and comfort gear. Even tire inflation technology has benefited from bicycle use. Also, tarps and rain gear are lighter and stronger because of hiking and bicycling demands. All these improvements make it easier to be comfortable and more capable of handling challenges on the road than what we had back when I first started riding in the early 1960s.

Trips in my 34 year old convertible sports car are more fun because of the size- and weight-saving technology shared with motorcycling. Also shared are the exposure to wind and sun. Thus, skin protection (clothing & SPF ointment) is another concern the motorcyclist and the open car tourist have in common.

Perhaps the most important thing the motorcycling community can share with those engaged in other open vehicle travel is safety. Being in the open, it is relatively easy for a biker to be aware of dangers posed by the road and others on the road. This creates (or at least should create) the habit of looking for things that might interfere with your safety.

This heightened sense of awareness not only is transferable from operating a motorcycle to driving a minivan, but it also makes both driving experiences more fun. After all, if you have trained yourself to be aware of what is around you, you are apt to notice more beautiful sunsets, interesting houses, and cool cars as you travel. Even more important, you will tend to drive more safely. That means you will have a better chance of riding again tomorrow!
